# Syllabus for TYBA English Paper V **Course: Literary Criticism**

(70: 30 Marks Examination Pattern)

### **Objectives of the Course:**

- 1. To introduce the learners to important critical terms

Students should scan the poem, identify the base metre (iamb, trochee), variations (pyrrhic, spondee, anapaest, dactyl, cretic, amphibrach, etc.), rhyme scheme, stanza forms if any, and the metrical peculiarities such as end-stopped lines, run-on lines, elision, caesura and other basic concepts of versification.

(5 marks for scanning and identifying the base metre, 4 marks for identifying modulations and other metrical peculiarities and 1 mark for rhyme scheme)
